

Six-month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

**Baptisms:** Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requires that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be active, practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If two Godparents: must be 1 male & 1 female; if one Godparent: may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Please call the rectory office. Officiate at the ceremony must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

**Please note:** The services of the Parish Organist are used for all sacramental liturgies.

### St. Anthony of Padua Catholic Church

Today the King of Glory processes into Jerusalem. Today the gift of the Father is being sent into the Capital of the Nation of Israel. A gift that was promised to the chosen few, and blossomed into the hope of salvation for all. What a mysterious and often misunderstood gift. "God could give no greater gift to men than to make his Word, through whom he created all things, their head and to join them to Him as His members, so that the Word might be both Son of God and son of man, one God with the Father, and one man with all men." Thus, the great doctor of grace—St Augustine, so eloquently presents the mystery of the Incarnation. The same mystery that the Apostle John emphasized in his own gospel account: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (Jn. 1:1). Augustine also traces out a complete spiritual theology based upon this mystery: "The result is that when we speak with God in prayer we do not separate the Son from the Him (The Father), and when the body of the Son prays it does not separate its head from itself: it is the one Savior of His body, our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who prays for us and in us and is Himself the object of our prayers." In short, Jesus is God! As God, one with the Father and the Holy Spirit, Jesus is the object of our prayers and worship! On this point I believe most Catholics would be clear. The next point, however, may be a little less self-evident. Jesus—the divine Word, in the incarnation took on our humanity. The second person of the Most Holy Trinity took our human nature and became one of us mortal humans. Ultimately, it was revealed that He took on the human nature specifically so that He could offer it as the atoning sacrifice for the sins of humanity. This is the priesthood of Jesus that is explored in the letter to the Hebrews. A continuing priesthood: "Therefore, He is always able to save those who approach God through Him, since He lives forever to make intercession for them" (Hb. 7:25). This mystery sheds a new light on the notion of liturgy.

'Why can't I worship God at home in my own way?' I'm sure most of us have heard this question/objection before. In theory, any soul is able to pray and observe some form of ritual in honor of God. However, this is not the established worship of the New Testament. Christ is our high priest and our official worship—our liturgy is primarily His worship. When we pray and practice our devotions at home, a good and holy practice that we should all be doing as families, we are praying as members of the body of Christ. We offer our prayers to Jesus, or the Father, or the Holy Spirit as members of the mystical body. The prayers are offered either to our mystical head (Jesus) or through the mystical head to the triune God. Such apractice is indeed how individual souls grow in holiness and sanctity as individuals and as families. But the liturgy is primarily the prayer of Christ. In the Mass, it is primarily the sacrificial offering of Christ on the cross being represented to the Father as an offering made present on our behalf. The formal liturgy of the Church is in essence the practice of the priesthood of Jesus being exercised through the human agents that we often call 'Father'. This is clearly worship on a level that transcends any form of "do it yourself worship". This is what Augustine is referring to: "Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who prays for us and in us and is Himself the object of our prayers."

Jesus of Nazareth, our Lord, our Priest, and our King. This weekend we liturgically welcome Him into Jerusalem with a procession of palms. A victory procession that should have led to our Lord being acknowledged and honored as the Christ of God. Yet, we know that in the mystery of the Father's providence, He would be honored and adored even more gloriously. We accompany the King of Glory on His victory procession upon the back of a donkey. Let us always recall the glory that is veiled behind this humble façade.

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#### Lenten Regulations on Fast & Abstinence

<u>Abstinence</u> from meat is observed on **Ash Wednesday, Good Friday**, and all the **Fridays of Lent** by all Catholics 14 years and older. Abstinence forbids the use of meat, but not of eggs, milk products, or condiments made of animal fat. Permissible are soups flavored with meat, meat gravy, and sauces.

<u>Fasting</u> is observed on **Ash Wednesday** and **Good Friday** by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those bound by this rule may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted as necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. Ordinary liquids only.

## Catholic Services Appeal 2022

Dear Friends in Christ,

Each year, all parishes in the Archdiocese of Detroit embark upon the CSA (<u>Catholic Services Appeal</u>) Drive. The CSA is a required collection taken up for the general operational expenses of the Archdiocese of Detroit. It helps to subsidize Catholic institutions that may not necessarily be connected to or funded by a particular parish. Among these special services are Campus Ministry, Telecommunications, Hospital and Prison Chaplaincies, Central Service Offices, which provide direct assistance to individual parishes, the Marriage Tribunal, and the like. Since the CSA provides for 62% of the operating budget of the Archdiocese, we are assessed or taxed a specific amount we are asked to meet. Our assessment is based upon many factors, including parish registration, Sunday collections, and financial status of the area within our parish boundaries. The detail of how our assessment is calculated, as well as how the money is used may be found on the insert included with today's bulletin.

The amount assessed to St. Anthony Parish this year is \$37,184. In order to reach our goal, the recommended pledge amount will be \$250 from each family

For your convenience, pledge forms can be found at the bottom of this page. Please complete the form and designate the amount of your pledge and the payment plan you prefer and return to the Parish Office. Pledges may also be made by calling the Parish Office 734-854-1143; sending your pledge via email (<u>stanthony@bex.net</u>) or by stopping by the Parish Office during regular business hours.

Your pledge can be made in several ways: paid in full and returned with your pledge form; a down payment returned with your pledge form, with the balance divided into quarterly payments, or divided evenly among 9 monthly payments. Credit card and automatic withdrawal payments and electronic funds transfers (EFT) will also be accepted. If you wish to contribute this way, please go to: give.aodcsa.org. Please select "St. Anthony, Temperance" on the online form where indicated. Donors may also call (888) 331-8695 to make an online or EFT request.

Please note: If you sign up to make payments on your pledge, the payment schedule will not begin until July 2022.

Please remember that we are required to make an accounting of all CSA cards for our Parish, so even if you are unable to pledge, we ask that you indicate that to the Parish Office as well.

I am grateful for your continued stewardship and prayers.
