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



Our Sacramental Policy †

Six-month Parish registration and participation are required for Baptism, Confirmation and Marriage.

Baptisms: Arrangements must be made in advance and parents must attend a baptism class. The Church requires that at least one of the parents be a practicing Catholic, and the Godparents must be active, practicing, fully initiated Catholics at least 16 years of age. If two Godparents: must be 1 male & 1 female; if one Godparent: may be male or female.

Marriage: Arrangements must be made at least nine months in advance. Please call the rectory office. Officiate at the ceremony must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Funerals: Officiate must be St. Anthony Parish Pastor or a family member.

Please note: The services of the Parish Organist are used for all sacramental liturgies.

Notes of Moderation

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"The mode of Christ's presence under the Eucharistic species is unique. It raises the Eucharist above all the sacraments as the perfection of the spiritual life and the end to which all the sacraments tend. In the most Blessed Sacrament of the Eucharist 'the body and blood, together with the soul and divinity, of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, the whole Christ is truly, really, and substantially contained.' This presence is called 'real'—by which is not intended to exclude the other types of presence as if they could not be 'real' too, but because it is **presence** in the fullest sense: that is to say, it is a substantial presence by which Christ, God and man, makes himself wholly and entirely present. (CCC 1374)"

When the Church was developing her authoritative catechism, the task of explaining the continuing presence of our Blessed Lord presented some difficulty. God is "omnipresent" meaning that since the Almighty is the very source of being itself, wherever you have anything that exists God is present is some manner via His creative and sustaining power (c.f. Ps. 139). Nevertheless, the fact of God's continual active presence everywhere did not mean that there were not distinctions in the mode of His divine presence. God can be seen in His works. His divine presence can be recognized in the splendor of nature. Yet, when Moses encountered the burning bush on Mt. Horeb, the Lord spoke to him: "Moses! Moses!...Do not come near! Remove your sandals from your feet, for the place where you stand is holy ground" (Ex. 3: 4-5). It would seem that God had become present upon Mt. Horeb in a manner or a "mode" that was different—more focused than His divine presence in the totality of earthly existence that rendered the location "holy ground".

Throughout the history of the Israelite people and the foundation of the old covenant there were recognized places and ceremonies that were distinguished as holy and sacred. The temple in Jerusalem was seen as the apex of sacred space in the worship of Israel. Before the façade of the temple the sacrifices of the old law were offered as gifts presented to the Almighty where His mysterious presence dwelled in the inner most chamber of the temple known as the "holy of holies". Of course, the idea of various "modes" of the divine presence took on a completely new level with the incarnation. When "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (Jn. 1: 14).

The eternal Word of God, who was God and remains God took upon Himself a human nature. Our Blessed Lord walked among men, taught them of the mysteries and the love of the divine and almighty Father, suffered and died for the sins of humanity, rose from the grave declaring His victory over sin and death, and ascended into heaven in order to take His rightful place at the right hand of His Father. Yet, He left His disciples with a promise: "And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age" (Mt. 28:20). The disciples of the Lord and the Church that succeeded them have followed in the tradition of Israelites in finding a mysterious presence of the Lord in various times, locations, and ceremonies. As the catechism explains: "Christ Jesus...is present in many ways to His Church: in His word, in His Church's prayer, 'where two or three are gathered in my name,' in the sacraments of which He is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But 'He is present...most especially in the Eucharistic species" (CCC 1373). This mysterious presence is what we refer to as the "real presence". Our faith presents us with the unseen reality that a change has occurred in the holy sacrifice of the Mass. The Lamb of God, our blessed Savior, who is the ultimate priest and victim of the offering upon the cross, becomes present. That which was offered by the human minister, bread and wine, cease to be. What remains is the body and blood of our Blessed Savior. The totality of the Christ, His Body, His Blood, His human Soul, and His divine person hood, become totally and really present and appear to us as bread and wine. This is the reason for the exaltation of the tabernacles within our Churches. This is the reason that we have been instructed from childhood to genuflect whenever we entered a Church or walked before the tabernacle. The Lord is present to us and this presence is complete and substantial in the species of the sacred host within the tabernacles of our Churches.

Being one of the many Catholics in the modern world who was raised in the faith and then took an unauthorized leave of absence, I experienced a sense of awe in my twenties as I seemed to be discovering the Faith I was raised in for the first time. Among the various treasures that I was rediscovering, the teaching of the 'real presence' of Christ in the Eucharist was shocking. I recall my teachers from grade school speaking about how we believe that the bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Christ. However, the concept that the Lord was present in an enduring way, that if I were to enter the Church and kneel before the sacrament, that I was in fact kneeling in the very presence of the resurrected Christ Himself, this was a notion that I had somehow missed in my catechism classes. How had this escaped my notice? Suddenly this practice of "Eucharistic adoration" began to make sense. The old devotions of "Jesus, prisoner of love" fell into place. The images of pious religious kneeling for extended periods of time before the sacred host pouring out their hearts and souls in prayer began to compute. Furthermore, the treasure that our Blessed Lord had left to His Church, the immeasurable grace that made the Catholic faith unique among all the various groups that lay claim to the title 'Christian' suddenly became very apparent. Jesus promised to remain with us, and He is continually fulfilling that promise. The 'real presence' of Jesus in the Eucharist is a mystery that we will continue to probe and ponder as we continue in this year of "Eucharistic revival", but for the moment perhaps we could simply allow our gratitude to grow as we allow ourselves to marvel at the wonder of God's gift. Perhaps we could make some time this week to come and visit with our Lord in the silence of the Church, to sit with Him in the silence, and invite Him to touch our hearts. We could ask for some additional graces that we might come to know Him and love Him more completely in the light of this mystery of the ancient faith. Christ is with us! Can we not make some time to be with Him? God love you,



GOSPEL MEDITATION ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

September 17, 2023 - 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was in second grade, my prized possession was a metal Star Wars-themed lunch box. After school one day, another student ripped it from my hands. I helplessly watched in horror as my classmate threw it to the ground and violently stomped it into an unrecognizable heap of junk. I came home covered in tears of shame and rage. After a few months, I



never thought about it again ... until I was almost thirty years old and on a retreat to prepare for ordination to the priesthood.

That childhood memory — and the attendant outrage — came back afresh. My spiritual director helped me in the process of acknowledging that I was angry because that kid owed me my lunch box. Then she helped me, through the grace of Jesus, to forgive the debt. Almost immediately I felt a new peace. I was amazed that I hadn't forgotten what I had lost, even from years before. Aren't we human beings simply amazing at remembering what people owe us?

We see this week in Jesus' parable a servant who is forgiven much but then commands another servant: "Pay back what you owe!" He can't forget or let go of how he was wronged. He remembers — and he becomes a monster because of it. If only he had remembered not only the debts owed to him, but also his greater debt owed to — and forgiven by — his master. It's natural for us to remember what others owe us. But when we contextualize those offenses in Jesus' mercy toward us and them, we're free to be merciful like the Master and less like a monster who never forgets.

Catholic Services Appeal - 2023

Dear Friends in Christ,

Each year, all parishes in the Archdiocese of Detroit embark upon the CSA (<u>Catholic Services Appeal</u>) Drive. The CSA is a required collection taken up for the general operational expenses of the Archdiocese of Detroit. It helps to subsidize Catholic institutions that may not necessarily be connected to or funded by a particular parish. Among these special services are Campus Ministry, Telecommunications, Hospital and Prison Chaplaincies, Central Service Offices, which provide direct assistance to individual parishes, the Marriage Tribunal, and the like. Since the CSA provides for 62% of the operating budget of the Archdiocese, we are assessed or taxed a specific amount we are asked to meet. Our assessment is based upon many factors, including parish registration, Sunday collections, and financial status of the area within our parish boundaries. The detail of how our assessment is calculated, as well as how the money is used may be found on the insert included with today's bulletin.

The amount assessed to St. Anthony Parish this year is \$38,555. In order to reach our goal, the recommended pledge amount will be \$250 from each family.

Please complete the form and designate the amount of your pledge and the payment plan you prefer and return to the Parish Office. Pledges may also be made by calling the Parish Office 734-854-1143; sending your pledge via email (<u>stanthony@bex.net</u>) or by stopping by the Parish Office during regular business hours.

Your pledge can be made in several ways: paid in full and returned with your pledge form; a down payment returned with your pledge form, with the balance divided into quarterly payments, or divided evenly among 9 monthly payments. Credit card and automatic withdrawal payments and electronic funds transfers (EFT) will also be accepted. If you wish to contribute this way, please go to: give.aodcsa.org. Please select "St. Anthony, Temperance" on the online form where indicated. Donors may also call (888) 331-8695 to make an online or EFT request.

Please note: If you sign up to make payments on your pledge, the payment schedule will not begin until July 2023.

Please remember that we are required to make an accounting of all CSA cards for our Parish, so even if you are unable to pledge, we ask that you indicate that to the Parish Office as well.
